Competitive Baseball

Reedville baseball participates in JBO, Junior Baseball Organization. JBO is competitive baseball for players ages 9-14. There are three age groups created; Midget (9-10), Junior (11-12) and Senior (13-14). Within each age group there are also three distinct skill levels, National (competitive), American (more competitive) and Federal (very competitive). The level your child will participate in will be determined during evaluation in early March 2009.

NATIONAL:

This level is competitive. This level is less demanding than American. At this level teams will practice two to three times a week. Teams will play in two to four tournaments that may have them travel outside the metro area and may include overnight stays. Teams will play in 25 to 40 games over the course of the season. There will be additional costs for tournaments and uniform extras.

AMERICAN:

This level is more competitive. This level is less demanding than Federal but more demanding than National. Teams will practice three to four days a week. Teams will play in four to six tournaments that may have them travel outside the metro area and may include overnight stays. Teams will play in 30 to 45 games over the course of the season. There will be additional costs for tournaments and uniform extras.

FEDERAL:

This level is for VERY competitive baseball players. At this level teams will practice four to five days a week. Teams will play in five to eight tournaments that will have them travel outside the metro area and may include overnight stays. Teams will play in 45 to 60 games over the course of the season. There will be additional costs for tournaments and uniform extras.

Each coach will determine how many tournaments they play in. Reedville Baseball gives you one home tournament that will be played at one of our schools for free. Reedville Baseball requires each team (coaches/parents/players) to host a tournament put on by Reedville Baseball to get an away tournament paid for. Tournament costs can range from \$250 to \$400 each.

Hosting a tournament consists of manning the snack shack, setting up the fields before and after each game, policing the fields for trash, and handing out awards for tournament winners. Reedville Recreation Baseball

The majority of Reedville youth baseball players participating in Reedville Baseball Inc. (RBI) compete in what is commonly referred to as "recreational baseball." The first two age groups within RBI, Pee Wee's (4-6 years old) and Rookies (7-8 years old) compete only on the recreation level. For players within our Midget age group (9-10) are encouraged to try out for our three classes of competitive baseball (National, American and Federal) however a majority of players will still continue to play at the recreation level. Once players move to the Junior or Senior level (11-14) the teams are exclusively competitive and recreational baseball is no longer an option.

Do not confuse recreation league baseball as "non-competitive." Anyone who has ever been to a Rookie game at Ladd Acres will tell you both teams are competing hard and every kid, coach and parent is excited when they win a game. With the exception of the Pee-Wee level (where scores are not kept), each level has an end of the season tournament where one team will win a tournament championship. It is the goal of Reedville Baseball not just to teach Baseball, but also to teach good sportsmanship and competitive spirit at every level.

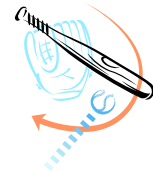
The primary difference between "recreational baseball" and "competitive baseball" is the complexity of the game. Recreation baseball focuses on the fundamentals of throwing, catching and hitting the baseball. More than 65% of Reedville youth baseball players will play recreation baseball in 2009. Our goal is to have 26 recreational league teams competing on fields at Ladd Acres Elementary, Indian Hills Elementary, Butternut Creek Elementary and Tobias Elementary.

Recreational baseball is the heart and soul of RBI. Without our participants at the recreational level, we would not be one of the most successful Junior Baseball Organizations in Oregon. Reedville Fall Baseball

One of the fastest growing programs of Reedville Baseball (RBI) is Fall Baseball. The late summer/early fall league, more commonly known as "Fall Ball" features Reedville Teams at the Midget and Junior Level. Fall Ball is offered as a secondary sports option to the traditional fall sports of Football and Soccer. Therefore, practice is usually only once or twice a week and games are only on Sunday afternoons. Fall Ball is also economically priced so your family can afford to have children in more than one sports option.

Fall Ball typically begins practice in late August and games the start second week of September. The season is short, usually between 6-8 games ending in mid-October. Fall Ball focuses on giving players who will be moving "up" in age group from one level (Rookies to Midgets for example) experience at the next level of play. Additionally, many players who play in the spring play Fall Ball to keep their skills sharp or just because they love to play.

One of the most exciting parts of Fall Ball is the diversity of teams and locations for games. In 2007, we had 5 Midget level teams (8-10) and 2 Junior level teams (11-12) playing against each other and teams from Sherwood, North Plains, St. Helens, Newberg, Groner, Lincoln and Hillsboro. The Junior league included 12 teams from around the region and the Midget league had 10. In 2008, Fall Ball has grown from a rag-tag mix of 6-8 teams league wide to a fully fledged league with more than 25 teams participating at the Midget and Junior level.

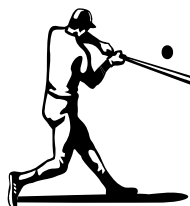
Fall Ball is typically a little more laid back and focused on helping players diversify their skills. Kids play many different positions and get an opportunity to play positions they might not typically play in the summer.

Hilhi has a New Leader

It's great to be back in the Hillsboro community. I grew up on the fields of Ladd Acres, Reedville, Indian Hills and Brown Jr. High. I still have memories of my days in Reedville Baseball, especially winning the first ever Reedville Baseball State Championship. After leaving Reedville Baseball, I attended Hilhi. During my four years at Hilhi, we won a Metro League Championship (1994) and a State Championship (1993). After graduating from Hilhi, I attended Oregon State University on a baseball scholarship. Much of what I teach, hitting wise, comes from my playing days under Pat Casey. After completing my four years at OSU, I was drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies, as a pitcher, in the 22nd Round of the 1998 MLB Draft. I spent just under five years in their minor league system winning a league championship in 2001 with AA Reading. I spent a few years playing on multiple independent teams before I signed a free agent contract with the Baltimore Orioles in August of 2005. One week later, while pitching for AA Bowie Baysox, I threw the team's first no-hitter against the Erie Seawolves. The following year while playing for an independent team, I retired from professional baseball to become the head coach at Aloha High School. Much of what I teach, pitching wise, comes from a multitude of players and coaches that I played alongside during my nine years in professional baseball. My high school coaching career started eight years ago as the freshman coach at Central Catholic High School. I have coached every level in high school. I also ran my own hitting and pitching camps for youth 9-18 years old at Hare Field during my playing days. I'm very excited to be back working with the youth of the Hillsboro community. I am impressed with the improvements at Ladd Acres and Brown Jr. High. The youth have quality fields to play on and hopefully that will help with the overall improvement of our youth. I believe that the success of an organization is a team effort. Every individual involved has a role to play in order for that organization to be as successful as possible. The Hilhi Baseball program will run youth baseball camps in the future. These will be posted on the Reedville Baseball website. I am looking forward to working with Reedville Baseball and the future high school baseball players in the Hillsboro community. Once again, it's great to be back and stop by Hare Field in the spring.

I have coached a variety of sports over the last 20 years including baseball, basketball, football, and even a bit of High School soccer. Last year was my first season as the Baseball Coach for Century and I truly enjoyed my experience. In our first year as a new staff we were fortunate to make the Play-Offs for the first time in six years which was very exciting for all involved and we hope to continue with that success this season. As I stated last year I would not consider myself just a "baseball guy" or "basketball guy" but more of a teacher and coach of athletics and life. I enjoy competition and genuinely have a good time when I am on the field. Those that know me well understand that I hold players accountable for their behavior and actions no matter what level of player they are or think they are. The coaching staff has continued to work hard at rebuilding our program and implementing a culture that is positive, develops quality young men, and builds a solid baseball background for players. The following is a small piece of our philosophy we adhere to in our program.

As coaches we will promote the following statement:

"Play hard, Play loose, and Play without fear."

Century baseball coaches will maintain the perspective that the person is the most valuable asset we have to develop. Our goal is to create a family environment in our program. It is our job to fill the player's emotional tank when under our tutelage. We will teach during failures and praise during success. When a player or team's success becomes about us, the coaches, and not the person then we need to step back and reevaluate our perspective.

Our goal is to create an environment where fear of failure does not exist and the willingness to risk and play without fear is nurtured. Though we value one player's ability to hit over another player, we value all players equally as human beings.

Players will be taught to move on to the next play (quickly) no matter what the result of the prior play. This must be modeled by the coach or it is an empty request and behavior change will not occur in the player. The field is not the place to display negative emotions so both coaches and players strive to model this at Century.

I look forward to continue building a positive relationship between Century Baseball and Reedville Baseball.

First, I want to thank all Reedville Participants who attended our annual meeting for re-electing me to the Board of Directors. This is a responsibility I take very seriously and a volunteer activity I enjoy immensely. My wife Kaycee and I chose to place our son Andrew in Reedville Baseball five years ago because we believed it was one of the best organized and well-run organizations on the west side. Growing up in Aloha, Reedville had a reputation for being competitive and well-coached. The spirit of Reedville Baseball is to develop a child's baseball skill while teaching them to love the game of baseball. Each coach has his own style but I am continually impressed with the commitment Reedville makes to developing good coaches and athletes.

This is my second year as a member of the Reedville Board of Directors and my fifth year in Reedville Baseball. I have had the privilege of coaching six different teams at the Pee-wee, Jr. Midget and Midget level. I spent last season as the Director of Recreation Baseball and chose this season to switch positions in part because I enjoy doing field work so much. As a teenager, I spent five years working for Tualatin Hills Park and Recreation District maintaining more than 125 district baseball fields and supervising seasonal staff for athletic fields' maintenance at the THPRD Athletic Complex. It was an experience I enjoyed and the opportunity to spend time working on fields again is exciting.

This season, we intend to raise the bar for fields' maintenance. From March to mid October, Reedville maintains 19 baseball fields with 9-13 of those fields being used on a daily basis for games or practice. Some receive maintenance every day; others receive maintenance on a sporadic basis. The important thing to know is that ALL OF THE WORK DONE is primarily completed by volunteers dedicated to providing safe, nice baseball fields for our children. This season, we will attempt to assemble a "fields committee" that will assist in maintenance functions throughout the season. Many folks do not realize that each season at least a quarter of all funds received by the league are spent on maintaining our baseball fields. Our commitment has paid off as we are widely considered to have some of the finest adolescent baseball facilities in the Metropolitan Area. Teams clamor to play in Reedville Tournaments largely because of our field work. My goal this season is to provide safe, playable fields that remain green and well maintained throughout the season.

I also serve as Reedville's Fall Ball Coordinator. While I enjoy baseball throughout the year, Fall Ball is my personal favorite. Fall

Ball has grown from a rag-tag mix of 6-8 teams league wide to a fully fledged league with more than 25 teams participating at the Midget and Junior level. Reedville is the organizer and administrator of this league, which includes teams from Washington, Yamhill, Columbia and Multnomah County. The primary focus of the league is the development of players who have played kid pitch baseball but would like to improve their skills with extra games in the fall. The league is competitive, but reasonably low key with only three meetings allowed per week. While no other organization in Fall Ball fields more than three teams, Reedville boasted 11 teams and 126 participants for Fall Ball! Our goal this coming season is to maintain the program and continue developing skills while refining the placement process. Thank you again for allowing me to be a member of the Board of Directors. I appreciate your support and effort each year.
